COMM 1851 – Introduction to Film

Course Description

Motion pictures have become a worldwide form of entertainment, the rare item that can combine high artistic endeavor with huge international business. My goal with this online course is to introduce you to both sides of this coin. You will learn about the aesthetic, technical and entrepreneurial aspects utilized in making films, the history of filmmaking, and the theories at work behind the craft. The films we'll view will range from the birth of cinema to modern day. You'll cultivate a deeper understanding and appreciation of cinema, both as an art form and a mirror of society and culture, and you'll engage in analysis of the medium and its messages.

When you finish this class, if you decide to further your instruction in film, you'll have a better idea of how the different disciplines of film intertwine with one another, before you begin your own projects. If you have no interest in production, you'll learn more about the filmmaking process, and how the industry works. In either case, you'll watch a number of great movies, and hopefully you'll have some fun.

Course Objectives

- To develop cinematic literacy
- To consider many technical, craft and business-based components of cinema
- To analyze the aesthetic properties of the medium
- To consider about the theories and ideas of film genre and authorship
- To analyze cinematic subtexts and the underlying meanings of films
- To develop critical and analytical skills in viewing and writing about film

If you are unable to access these platforms, please be prepared to pay for rentals of the films by using a different streaming platform (Amazon, iTunes) Please give full attention to the viewings.

Assignment Guidelines

INDIVIDUAL GUIDELINES FOR EACH ASSIGNMENT WILL BE POSTED ON ECOURSEWARE.

Viewing Exercises. 40 points out of 100.

Films will be viewed for analysis. Each student will type four short response papers ranging in length from 250-500 words. These written assignments will be submitted online via eCourseware dropbox. Guidelines for each exercise will be posted on eCourseware. Bibliographies should accompany each exercise.

Quizzes. 30 points out of 100.

Quizzes assess knowledge from readings during the week. While quizzes in the class are "open book," it's important to note that quizzes have a stated time limit. Quizzes have a mixture of multiple choice, true/false, fill-in the blank, and short answer.

Discussion Board for Posting/Participation. 20 points out of 100.

Discussion board postings respond to questions posed by the instructor. After posting your initial required discussion, you must comment upon the postings of at least two other students in the class. Your grade for each posting will reflect the degree to which you respond thoughtfully to the Discussion Board question and to the comments of other members of the class.

Each Discussion Board posting will consist of the following:

- your initial 250-word discussion
- two 100-word commentaries on others' postings

Please expect to communicate with me by eCourseware e-mail about your progress in the course. You should check in to the course eCourseware site every day to read the home page "News" announcements and to answer any e-mail from me.

Final Exam. 10 points out of 100.

The final exam is cumulative and will test on all content of the class from readings to viewings. Similar to the quizzes, the exam will have a time limit. It will be a mixture of multiple choice, true/false, fill-in the blank, and short answer.

Be aware, information found in the readings will appear on the quizzes. Information from readings and viewings will appear on the final exam.

A note on book editions: We will continue to use the 1st edition of the textbook for this class. However, the 2nd edition of the textbook was released in May 2020. It seems that the only major difference is that the 2nd edition has two extra chapters added at the end. If you end up purchasing the 2nd edition, you should still be able to use it for class.

The films have been chosen for their ability to demonstrate the key concepts of the course and, in many cases, for their ability to engage us intellectually and aesthetically. Some films might contain ideas, images, or words that are offensive to some members of the class. Please be prepared to analyze and think about films whether you like them or not. By remaining enrolled, you acknowledge and accept this element of the course.
