What is an Academic Job Talk?

Simply put, an academic job talk is a presentation of a candidate's research to their prospective employers, colleagues, students, etc. in the department.

The job talk is the candidate's chance to demonstrate their abilities in research and teaching as well as their compatibility with the department and its faculty members.

In the hiring process, the job talk usually occurs during the campus visit. The campus visit is usually at the end of the process and occurs after applications have been reviewed and phone interviews have been conducted. A university will usually only invite 2-3 candidates for campus visits during which the candidate will often meet with faculty members, students, and give a job talk and/or a teaching lecture.



Typically, a job talk will start with a formal presentation by the applicant and then a time for questions from the audience or a more structured Q&A session. However, you should always determine the expectations of that specific institution or department. Some additional information to know would be: expected audience, allotted time, details about the space you will be using, and what equipment will be provided.

What is an Academic Job Talk?

The best way to truly know what an academic job talk entails is to attend one. Seeing one for yourself, can help you prepare should you ever go on the academic job market yourself. Pay attention to how a job talk is conducted, what questions are asked, how the candidate presents the info, etc.
