Establishment of SECoPA

The Southeastern Conference for Public Administration (SECoPA) was established in 1978 in order to facilitate the promotion of public administration research, scholarship, and professionalism throughout the Southeastern United States. Prior to its formation, southeastern-based chapters of the American Society for Public Administration (ASPA) organized annual Southeast Regional Conferences.

The official Articles of Incorporation were adopted on June 23, 1978, and filed September 14, 1978. The organization was incorporated by faculty from several Florida institutions, including the University of South Florida, University of West Florida and Florida State University. The first (temporary) Chairman was Augustus B. Turnbull, III, and the first (temporary) Secretary was C. E. Teasley, III.

Kathryn E. Hensley Distinguished Public Service Practitioner Award

Recognizes sustained outstanding achievement in, and contributions to, public service and public administration through applied practice in the field. The committee will receive and assess nominations and will present the award at a scheduled luncheon or banquet event as part of the general SECOPA Conference. The award may be deferred if the committee determines that none of the submitted nominations meet the criteria or merit presentation of the award.

Morris W.H. Collins Award

Recognizes the most outstanding paper written by a doctoral student enrolled at a school within the SECOPA region.

Robert Kline Award

Recognizes the most outstanding paper written by a master's student enrolled at a school within the SECOPA region.

Awards presented at the Friday Luncheon

Donato J. Pugliese Award

Recognizes a senior SECoPA member who has made contributions to SECoPA and to the profession of public service.

Senator Peter B. Boorsma Award

Recognizes significant and established record of international activity and direct involvement in the exchange of international public administration theory and practices.

SECoPA Award for Outstanding Equity Research

Any manuscript delivered at the annual SECoPA conference is eligible for this award, provided it addresses a core aspect of equity as its central focus. This might include social equity, race, gender, or class-based equity, income equity, geographical equity, and so on. Authors may include faculty scholars, students, practitioners, or any combination thereof. In order to be eligible for this award, contenders must submit their proposal and be invited to present during the annual conference.



The former home of blues legend Memphis Slim was redeveloped by the Memphis Music Magnet plan, developed by community partners, industry stakeholders, and students in two U of M special topics courses led by Charlie Santo, (Department of City and Regional Planning) as a music-centered community space for artistic collaboration, music training and storytelling. 





Most recently, he has served as the Chief Public Policy Officer for Seeding Success, where he was one of the legislative architects and advocates for the city and county's joint Pre-k ordinance and successful passage of the Opportunity Act that unlocked \$754 million in unspent Temporary Assistance for Family funding allotted to Tennessee. As Chief Policy Officer, Haley played a key role in a public-private partnership that developed a strategic plan, known as More For Memphis, to address the most important factors impacting social and economic mobility in Memphis and Shelby County. Haley received a B.S. in political science from the University of Tennessee at Martin, a Master of Public Policy degree from The American University, and a J.D. from the University of Illinois College of Law. Haley resides in Midtown with his wife, Olivia, and their children Thomas, Amelia, and Oliver.
